We have been in the process over the past few months, and months to come, training new members to become pump operators. This involves obtaining their Class 3 Air Brakes license, hours of driving, and learning how to operate the pumps on each truck. This process can take up to a year and is a huge commitment not only to those learning, but those training them as well.

This was put in use already in assisting EHS extricate a patient who fell down a small basement hatch.

April 20th-Members painted the bottom of our boat. We plan on putting the boat in the water in the next few weeks.

Jane Ritcey allows us to have a floating dock attached to her A&K property within a gated secured area, This allows us to keep the boat in the water a majority of the summer for a quicker response

April 22nd-One member attended a table top EMO exercise on Wildland fire fighting at the Bridgewater fire station. There will be a field training session in the fall

April 25th-Deputy Chief Dave Robb was recognised as our Volunteer of the Year at a town event

April 26th-We had a call to our fire station for an alarm. Nothing found. Chubb was called in to check the system and they are recommending replacing the 26 year old system. They will be sending an estimate

Misc Operational

93 members attended 32 hours of activities for a total of 162 personal hours were spent on misc operational duties this month.

This included various meetings, Canada Day on the waterfront, filling pools, Ladder 1 to Dartmouth, Bridgewater parade, Pride Flag Raising.

Total of 1001.5 personnel hours this month.

Not included is Officer and Pump Operator week end stand by coverage to ensure at least 1 of each are around.

Trucks are giving us a huge issue in the past couple months.

Our Ladder truck seems to be working fine and is back in service, but there is still a Check Engine light on that is continuing to be investigated.

Minor issues with our Engines are resolved, and during last month's annual pump checks, there have been issues with Tanker 6, requiring a pump repair and currently awaiting work on the gear box. This

truck is currently out of service and we have Dayspring Fire Department automatic to the scene with their tanker to all calls in the district.

Hopes to have this back in service by mid-August

Once again, a huge thank you to Donnie Heckman who has been on top of these issues since day one and has spent many many hours and kilometers driving back and forth from his Heckmans Island home working on getting these trucks up and running.

The June 21st rain and thunder storms didn't seem to hit our area as hard as other, but we still had 5 calls that night for investigations of flooded basements and lightning strikes. Although we do not pump out flooded basements, we will respond if requested to advise power shut off and other help we can give.

HIGHLIGHTS

July 1st- Our Engine 2 and Antique Hose Truck with myself and 5 fire fighters attended the Canada Day waterfront event. This was a well-attended event with a huge interest in our trucks and gave us an opportunity to connect with the public

July 11th –I attended, with Engine 2 the Pride Flag raising ceremony.

July 15th- The auditorium was rented out for the Pride Drag events. Although we were not involved, there has been some Facebook comments stating that the fire department should not be involved in these events. Some appeared to come as far away as the states. I didn't respond but did contact the RCMP asking for some extra drive bys and gave them a heads up of possible problems. Thankfully there were none.

July 22nd- I did a drive around the town and entire district to ensure access was not blocked by flooding or road wash outs. Compared to other areas in the county, the only issue was a small portion of the Upper First Peninsula had some ruts washed out across the road, but was completely passable.

July 26th-Engine 2 and I marched, in the Bridgewater Exhibition parade.

In light of the recent wild land fires, we are asking for the publics support in raising approx. \$9000 to purchase a portable pump and other equipment specific to fighting wild land fires.

In the past, we relied on our structural firefighting equipment as we didn't have room on our trucks for this specialised equipment. With the purchase of our new Heavy Rescue, we now have space to store it. What we don't raise, we will look at taking the rest out of the Operating Equipment budget at the end of the year if there is any left.

Sept 10th- our color party participated in the annual Fishers Memorial service held on the waterfront at the Memorial Monument

Sept 16-17th- Arrival of TS Lee

The department was very busy over these few days answering 6 alarms and providing stand by coverage. Downed power lines, tree falling towards a house and alarms were the common calls.

Sept 17-20- I attended my first Canadian Fire Chiefs conference in Halifax.

I found this to be a very informative conference with input from every province and territory.

Issues like increasing wildfires, and the need to pre plan these, recruitment and retention of volunteer fire fighters, homelessness, health and wellness awareness of fire fighters, and climate change, are just some of the issues common through out the country. Putting a larger work load on Fire Chiefs on how to deal with these issues.

Speakers on mental health, cancer awareness and prevention, services across the country and other interesting speakers.

These conferences also gives me the opportunity to meet socially and discuss various topics. I spoke to Chiefs from every province and territory.

The next conference will be held in Montreal and I would like to have this added to the 2024/25 operating budget for consideration. I will have numbers when the budget is being drawn up for approval.

With the increased number and larger wildfires, we feel the need for specialised wildland firefighting equipment. Before looking for budget money, we put out a fundraiser campaign and with the help of one large \$10 000 donation, we raised approx. \$12 000.

We will be working on ordering this equipment early winter to hope to have it by next spring.

Sept 23rd- 2 teams participated in the Lunenburg Regional Fire and Emergency Services golf tournament at the Osprey Golf course

Sept 30th-Originally scheduled for Sept 23rd, but postponed due to Tropical Storm Lee, Bridgewater Fire Department hosted the second annual Todd Arenburg Truck show.

Our new Utility 7 came home with the best Utility in the show award.

Ladder 1 finally seems to be working fine.

Tanker 6 is still waiting on the new pump. Estimated cost will be approx. \$15 000 and will be 8-10 weeks.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Oct 1st-Ladder 1 and members were invited to attend the Chester Basin Fire Department open house

Oct 8th-Memorial Monument service. Gordon Conrads name was added
-Church service was held this year at the Presbyterian Church and social followed at the hall

Oct 10th-Fire drills at the Blockhouse Hill and Cornwallis Seniors apartments

Oct 11th-Mutual Aid parade in Mahone Bay

Oct 12th-Fire drill at the Bluenose Academy and smoke detectors were given to the first year primary class.

-Fire truck taken to the Academy for the pre-primary classes

-Open House-well attended by several families

Oct 13th- I was asked to observe the annual Harbour Haven emergency drill

Oct 14th-Our Ladder and members participated in an exercise in Chester where they laid several hundred feet of 5 inch hose from the harbour to Shoreham Village Nursing Home. Several Engines relayed the water to our ladder to ensure it could supply the water.

This information can be used in town and the district to help us pre plan what we may need in case of a major fire in our area.

-Our Annual Jeff Lily Memorial golf tournament where we had 7 teams of 4 participates with our end of Fire Prevention week social that followed at the hall.

Oct 15th-Engine 3 and several members participated in the Female Fire Fighters networking day hosted by Hebbville and Bridgewater fire departments. Over 60 females participated in this all day event.

Oct 16-20th-Vehicle have been taken to Fleet Tech for their annual MVIs

Oct 19th-Myself and D/C Robb attended the monthly LRFES meeting held at the Northfield Fire Station

-4 members spent 3+ hours doing scheduled maintenance on the ladder. This involves removing the old grease off the waterway and reapplying it, as well as washing down the entire ladder. This is done twice a year as well as after it is used and exposed to smoke.

Oct 26th-MFR practice involving an information session on new protocols EHS paramedics now following at a traumatic cardiac arrest, as well as some procedures.

Although some procedures are not in the scope of the MFR skills, it is important that they are aware of what the paramedics are able to do to assist them in any way.

Oct 28th-The Auxiliary help a pancake breakfast fundraiser at the fire station.

Oct 31st-Halloween night members gave out treats on Centennial Ave.

Regular fire crew stand by. No calls. This has been a quiet night with no calls since the 2001 church fire

We received a donation of \$2000 from the owner of the Rum Runner to go towards Wildland fire fighting equipment. This brings our total up to over \$14 000.

We hope to figure out what we need and order it by December to have it for the 2024 season.

New pump has been ordered for Tanker 6, and expected near the end of October for installation.

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To the Protective Services Committee
Re-Tanker 6 replacement

Our Tanker 6 is now 21 years old and showing its age.

This truck was originally due to be replaced in the 2024/25 budget year, but has been pushed back to 2025/26.

The department and its truck committee have been working on its replacement, needs and wants. We have been meeting with other departments with newer Tankers and various sales reps.

Since Covid, demand for trucks and delivery has greatly increased.

Delivery times range from possibly 18 to 36 months.

Prices have also drastically increased, some as much as 40% in the past few years.

For our past 2 trucks, we have been granted permission to send out the RFP a year ahead of the budgeted year.

I am requesting on behalf of the fire department that we be allowed to work on the RFP and have it sent out in the late winter/early spring of 2024.

Even with the estimated earliest delivery date of 18 months, this puts us in the scheduled 2025/26 budget year.

Currently the budgeted amount sits at \$798 000. As stated above, costs have taken a huge increase and I propose this be raised to \$900 000.

The truck we are working on is a basic tanker, with options that we feel will suit our needs for the next 20 years.

Keep in mind that when we designed our 2020 Engine, we added 700 gallons of water, and with our current mutual aid agreements we were able to eliminate our 2000 Tanker replacement, saving \$700 000 off the capital budget in 2020/21.
